Light the Candles... Temple's Turning 150!

Birthday parties are meaningful at any age, but especially at 150. Consider this the first of many invitations to observe Temple Emanu-El's sesquicentennial.

Beginning with these High Holy Days and for the next 15 months, we will celebrate coming together after so much isolation and quarantine. We will pay tribute to our history as a Reform congregation that brings meaning to people's lives and wholeness to God's world. We will commemorate the impact Temple has had on our city. We will secure our financial future by participating in a congregation-wide endowment campaign. And we will rededicate ourselves to our core values as we consider Temple Emanu-El's future as a center of strength and repair in a too-often broken world.

Our celebration will kick off with the Harvest events over three weeks this fall, beginning with the Sukkot Shabbat service and dinner on Oct. 14, followed by cooking demonstrations, discussions on food insecurity and social justice work to expand our impact in Dallas through community gardens.

In the spring, we will move to the Creations season, celebrating arts and the spiritual power of music with some breathtaking new works and performances. Our campus will come to life on a monumental scale with an interactive, multimedia art and technology experience; our cantors will lead special celebrations of Temple's place in Jewish music.

In the fall of 2023, our Rededication events will provide an in-depth look at our past and the future of synagogue life. Together we will explore what the next 50 years might require of Temple and the Dallas Jewish community.

As our 150th birthday party draws to a close, we will propel ourselves into the future with a symposium featuring many of Reform Judaism's influential leaders and other exciting events.

This birthday is especially impactful. It's going to be an incredible journey, as it has already been for Temple. We hope you find meaning, curiosity and inspiration in all that TE150 offers. As we dip our apples into honey this year, let us give thanks and say ***"L'Chaim — let the festivities begin!"***

The TE150 calendar has been planned with loving intention over many months, infused with the dedication and thoughtfulness of our committee chairs and volunteers, and in partnership with Temple clergy and staff. Jewish values and our sacred seasons have guided the decision-making.

Anchors

Over 15 months, we will observe three different phases of celebration.

HARVEST (p. 7)

Fall 2022: Beginning with The Kickoff: Congregational Shabbat Sukkot on Oct. 14, the Harvest events will explore Jewish values and justice related to food.

CREATIONS (p. 13)

Winter and Spring 2023: Occurring during seasons of rebirth and renewal, Creations events celebrate the arts and their power to build understanding and create community through a shared experience.

REDEDICATION (p. 19)

Fall 2023: These final months will bring us together to commemorate our past, recommit to our core values and to envision the future of Temple. They will launch next High Holy Days.

Foundations

Woven throughout the TE150 celebrations is a commitment to the values that have shaped our congregation (p. 23).

SPIRITUALITY: We will explore the evolution of Reform Jewish worship styles as we embrace the future of prayer, music and spirituality.

TORAH: We will study with Jewish scholars and consider the future of Reform Judaism.

SOCIAL JUSTICE: We will strengthen our social justice curriculum and rededicate ourselves to service to the broader community.

MUSIC: We will rejoice in new music created especially for our congregation while we honor our distinguished legacy of sacred music.

HISTORY: We will document our history and look ahead to the future with congregation-wide celebrations.

Our Continuing Story

At the time of this printing, some exciting details are still in process and events will be added as plans are finalized. A second booklet will be published at High Holy Days 2023 for the Rededication season.

TEMPLE THROUGH THE YEARS

1872

Eleven families form the Dallas Hebrew Benevolent Association, the first Jewish organization in Dallas. The association would become Temple Emanu-El.

1878

A number of members complain that the Temple prayer book, issued by the Reform movement in Cincinnati, lacks too many Jewish traditions. Some disgruntled members leave and the future of the Temple is in question. The solution: The congregation creates its own prayer book, which would be used for the next 20 years. The rift would foreshadow the tension between spiritual liberalism and tradition within the Reform movement and Temple Emanu-El late into the next century.

1899

Second Temple building at Ervay and St. Louis streets is dedicated. ▼



1917

A large, new Temple building is erected at South Boulevard and Harwood Street, a South Dallas neighborhood filled with Jewish families. The new building reflects an effort to attract younger people and families to the synagogue with socializing, lectures, concerts and room for all members at High Holy Days services. ➡

1876

Temple Emanu-El (translated: God is with us) opens at Commerce and Field streets, laying its spiritual foundation on Reform Judaism. It is the first Jewish house of worship to open in North Texas. ▼



1896

Temple adopts the Union Prayer Book, which encompasses the tenets of Classical Reform Judaism, eliminating traditional aspects such as mentioning Jews as the chosen people and a return to Israel.

1901

Rabbi William Greenburg leads Temple, the fourth rabbi in three years. Rabbi Greenburg is viewed as an intellectual with a passion for the arts and social welfare. ➡

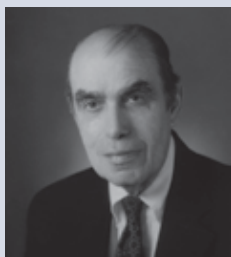


1923

Ray Israel is hired as Director of Education to upgrade and expand Temple's religious school and adult education. ➡

Lunch and Private Tour of 'Dali/Vermeer: A Dialogue'

11AM-1PM, Meadows Museum of Art

Connect with Temple members and art lovers to view this special exhibit of two paintings, both on loan, in an artistic conversation. For the first time ever, see Johannes Vermeer's "Woman Reading a Letter" (1663) juxtaposed with Salvador Dalí's "The Image Disappears," (1938), pictured top left and right. You'll also see a selection of Dalí's "Aliyah" series from the Meadows' collection, and Dalí's "L'Homme Poisson," the only painting by Dalí in a public collection in Texas. The tour will be led by Temple member and art historian Nancy Cohen Israel, Manager of Docent Programs at the Meadows Museum.

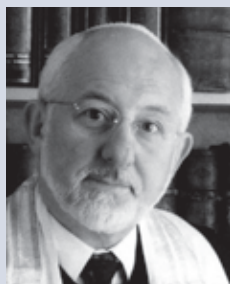

Social Justice

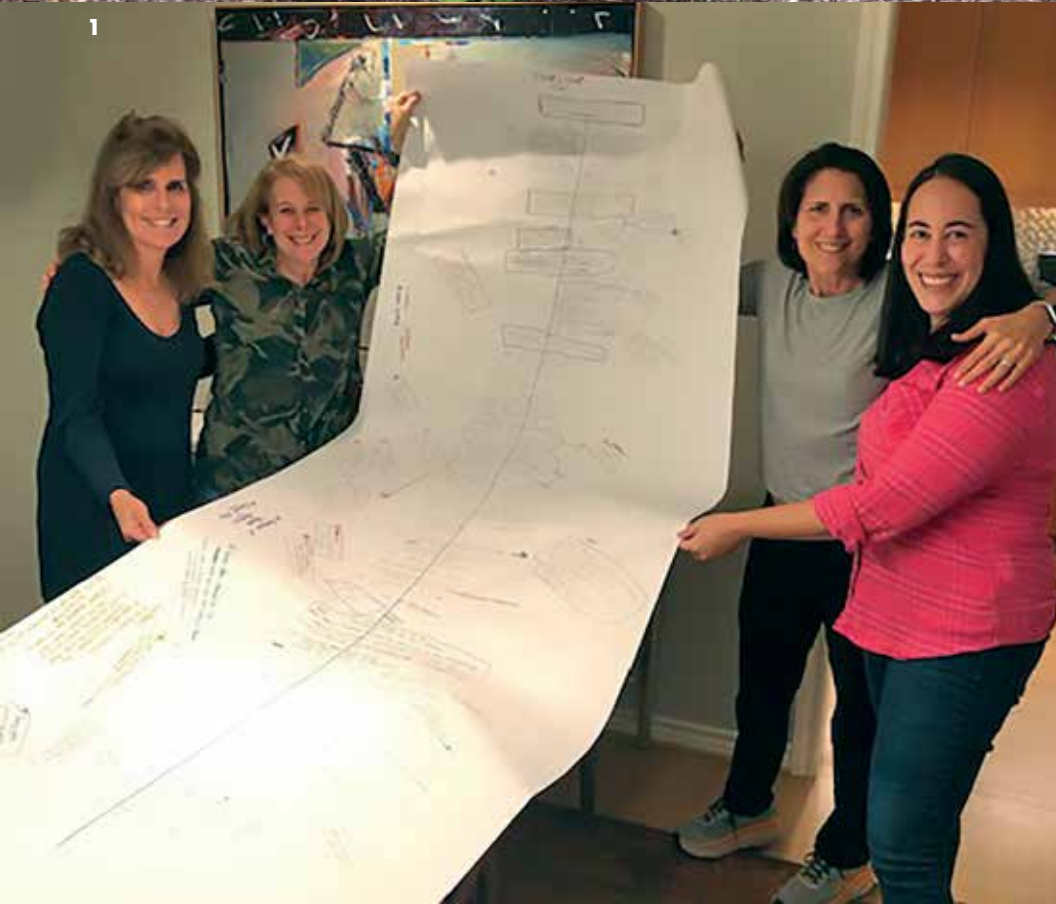
Fall 2023: Building on Temple's 150-year legacy of working to repair the world, we will unveil a comprehensive and age-appropriate social justice curriculum for Youth Learning + Engagement students that combines classroom learning with opportunities to engage in *tikkun olam*. In addition, we will begin a partnership with United to Learn and the Dallas ISD to promote STEM learning (science, technology, engineering and math) through school gardens. The first two schools are expected to be in Vickery Meadow, where Temple has been engaged for many years, and in the Forest Theater area of South Dallas, a short walk from Temple's historic location on South Boulevard.

Documenting Our History and Rededicating to Our Future

A dedicated group of volunteers is researching Temple's rich history through the lens of our core values of learning, worship, social justice, community and Israel. The project will be revealed at the Rededication weekend of Nov. 3-5, 2023, and include the following:

- **Timeline:** A depiction of Temple's history, with text, photos, video and audio.
- **Impact Map:** A visual representation of Temple's influence on Dallas, showing the sites, programs and institutions that Temple members are connected to, from DISD elementary schools to nonprofit agencies, parks and cultural venues.
- **Faces of Temple:** A photo exhibit of a diverse cross-section of Temple members, showing "the power of one:" the oneness of God and the power of one person to change the world.
- **A Year in the Life of Jill Stone Community Garden:** A visual chronicle of a year in the life of social justice in action at Temple's community garden.
