The ABC's of Abundance



ntil the late 19th century, the final character in the English alphabet was not the letter Z, but the symbol "&," known as an ampersand, and pronounced as a word: "and." (The ampersand was a mashing up of the two Latin letters which spell "et," the Latin word for "and.") So the alphabet that school children learned looked like this:

ABCDEFGHIJKLMNOPQRSTUVWXYZ&

As journalist Kathryn Schultz writes, "It is not clear when 'and' migrated out of the alphabet ... Today, typesetters and font designers regard the ampersand not as a letter but as punctuation, and the rest of us regard 'and' as only a word. Yet there is something apt about its former status as part of the alphabet."

Our 19th century forebears were onto something — the conjunction "and" is as fundamental to our experience as the letters of the alphabet itself. We live in an "and" world. Sometimes it is the "and" of overwhelm. Think of our to-do lists: I have to do this and this and this. Sometimes it is the "and" of complexity: the same person can be gentle and harsh, loving and impatient, wise and foolish — and that person is often us.

But this most simple conjunction also holds a spiritual key for these next two months. In November, we will celebrate Thanksgiving, the American secular holiday which, much like the Sukkot festival we observed last month, invites us to pause to offer gratitude for abundance in our lives. At Thanksgiving, we might identify that abundance with turkey, cranberry sauce and pecan pie, but when we're at our best, we recognize that food is just one (delicious) symbol of other instances of abundance that we might be privileged to experience: family, friendship, love, beauty, laughter, trust. Thanksgiving is about recognizing that our blessings sometimes mount up just like our to-do lists: and, and, and.

We live in a world in which hostility and distrust emerge from a sense of scarcity — the feeling that there will not be enough power to go around, enough wealth, enough physical security, enough jobs, enough love. So we build fences, literally and physically, to protect what we deem to be ours. The subjective conviction of scarcity morphs into a defining truth, and we use it to justify behaviors that inhibit and fracture community and the common good.

But a month after Thanksgiving, Hanukkah will come along on December 18 to offer a spiritual rebuttal to our sense of scarcity: we have more than we think. What looks like enough oil for one night can last for eight. What looks like the necessary income for my family can become some funds for tzedakah for someone in greater need. What looks like the money I get to keep because I worked hard for it can be used to lift my community. What looks like my precious time can make room to listen to a friend who needs me, to volunteer for a cause that will make a healing difference. We spend so much of our days convinced that we are short on time, short on funds, short on emotional resources like patience and compassion. But Hanukkah insists on abundance over scarcity, hope over fear. Because there is one night, and then another, and then another. And, and, and.

We're not exactly sure how or when "&" came off the end of the alphabet — it might even have been because it doesn't fit into the Mozart-based melody we use to remember the letters. But in these next two months, we might remember that our 19th century alphabet ended not with a letter, but with a word of possibility. That made it what we can surely use today: an alphabet of abundance, and an alphabet of hope.





he Torah readings through November and December dwell on the patriarchs and matriarchs of the Jewish people — their struggles and rewards, deceptions and loyalty, betrayals and forgiveness. We encounter Abram/Abraham when God tells him to "go forth" in Lech L'cha. We end 2022 on the brink of Exodus, when Joseph has reunited with his brothers and his father, Jacob, and the family settles comfortably in Egypt. Yes, we know that part of the story turns south with a few twists of the scrolls, but for now we breathe a sigh of relief at the human heart's capacity for reconciliation.

As our diverse Temple community gathers for religious and secular holidays alike over the next two months, our thoughts turn especially to families, the ones we were born into and the ones we choose. May they be sources of light and hope on dark days, and may we go forth into 2023 in comfort and love.

ver the coming months, Temple will welcome the Veremiov family into our community in an exciting resettlement initiative known as the HIAS Welcome Circles. Temple is one of nearly 23 U.S. congregations to sponsor a family as part of the program that started with Afghan refugees and has expanded to include Ukrainian refugees.

Dmytro, 34, and his wife Inna, and their three children, Yuliia, 17; Mark, 6; and Emily, 2; are from Dnipro, Ukraine, and fled to Poland with their two cats at the start of the war. They are eager to move to Dallas and get a fresh start. Before the war, Dimytro had been working as a real estate agent and Inna as a flower trader and store clerk. "In the US, we are going to continue our work after we get permission. We can also work in different jobs, we are very responsible and ready for new challenges."

We also extend our gratitude to past president Frank Risch, who has been involved with this effort as a Temple member and a member of the national HIAS Board of Directors.

"Through the generosity of our congregation, we have been able to offer many kinds of support for Ukrainian refugees," says Rabbi Kimberly Herzog Cohen. "Beginning with Cantor Vicky Glikin's Passover trip to Warsaw and direct contributions to on-the-ground volunteers, we are now expanding the circle of impact. This is a continuation of Temple's ongoing social justice work, in honor of our 150th year, as well as ensuring our legacy of tikkun olam for our future."

Dmytro expresses his family's deepest hopes: "We really hope to find truly kind people who will help us start a new life in the USA."



y Zadie told a story about what heaven must look like. He would say that God showed Moses two rooms: in the first, God showed a classroom where people argued, cursed, and screamed at one another. This, God tells Moses, for some people is the absolute hell. God then shows Moses a second identical classroom. There are the same chairs, books, tables, and people. Moses asks: "How can this be any different?" Vastly different, God explains, because for the people who love to learn this is heaven. What some see as arguing, cursing and screaming, others see as

wrestling and challenging one another. Zadie imparted the wisdom that we are never too old to start learning and it was his greatest joy to pass on the love of Jewish learning to our family.

There, I was immediately surrounded by an inclusive, diverse, and intellectually challenging Jewish learning community who spent an entire month, eight hours a day, six days a week wrestling and questioning the text in inspiring chavrutim (study partners).
